Founded in 1968 as a working ranch for boys, J Bar J has grown over the years to offer a continuum of programs and one major yearly event, The Oregon High Desert Classics, to address the needs of youth on their journey to adulthood.



Residential treatment program for adjudicated teen bovs

THE LEARNING CENTER

Private alternative program, contracted with the Bend-La Pine School District

Accredited through AdvancEd, these collaborative high school programs serve students at the J Bar J Ranch, J5 and the Academy at Sisters.

The Learning Center works to increase grade level skills and re-engage students in the learning process so they can become capable of leading successful lives.



Safe Families helps families in crisis who lack a safety net

By providing mentoring relationships for parents and temporary housing for children, the program connects them with needed support during a time of challenge including possible job loss, serious illness, homelessness, or other issues that complicate parenting.

The sole provider of a comprehensive spectrum of vouth services in Deschutes County, CYFC works with runaway and homeless youth, ages 16-20, providing emergency shelter and counseling and reuniting youth with families. Cascade Youth & Family Center

Yesterday, "Danny" and I were in the Burger King drive through, fulfilling my promise of milkshakes as a reward for him having just endured piles of paperwork, as he reflected on what Cascade Youth & Family Center has done for him. "Really, I should be the one buying you guys milkshakes for everything you do for me. Honestly, Maggie has done more for me in a week than my mom did for me my whole life."

While Danny definitely doesn't owe anyone a milkshake, it's true that Maggie, the LOFT shelter manager, and a number of other staff members have been the only positive, supportive connections in this 22 year old's life. He came from a childhood that was too abusive to share, and as soon as he was old enough, walked a few hundred miles alone until he landed in emergency shelter at the LOFT. In the years since then, Danny has grown into a goofy, thoughtful, and charismatic young man- always considering the LOFT his home whether living in the building or not.

Supporting him isn't always easy, as his developmental disabilities and past trauma sometimes play out in ways that make me feel like I'm working with a giant, fragile child. In the hours we've spent together; overcoming fear at the dentist, chatting about movies in the social security disability office waiting room, or using burritos and laughter to make necessary paperwork as painless as possible, I've learned how important the connection with CYFC has been for him. More than just "service providers," we're his Emergency Contact and sole source of birthday & Christmas gifts.

Each time I drop Danny off at the dilapidated shed he lives in, we share a cheery hug goodbye, and then I'm immediately fighting back tears as I watch him walk back into his largely solitary existence. It's hard to walk alongside such a gentle soul who's been so badly hurt, and fallen through the cracks in the social service system.

I'm happy to share that Danny's life is on the verge of an incredible improvement. Yesterday's chocolate shake was a celebration, and the paperwork we had been doing was for a rental subsidy he was awarded by NeighborImpact to move into his very own apartment at the beginning of next month. Soon, we'll get to help him move out of that shed forever, and into a place that he can proudly call his home- in addition to the LOFT community.

Grandma's House

I came to Grandma's House in November 2013, about a month before my daughter would be born. Prior to coming to Grandma's House I was living with my mom in a house built in 1910 with no heat (in super cold bend Oregon) this house was a far cry from a safe place to bring a newborn and has since been demolished due to unsafe living conditions.

Grandma's house welcomed me, and I finally had that "I can do this" feeling.

"Grandma's House connected me with an amazing doula and in late December I brought Kaya "home". Fast forward 4 months. I began doing volunteer work at a preschool through the DHS program that requires 20 hours of work a week to maintain income assistance. At the same time I was doing Ready2Rent classes through NeighborImpact and applying for their transitional housing program. In July of 2014 I got my own apartment! I spent 3 years there raising my daughter, working hard and we actually bought a home in May 2017!

Essential Principals for Developing Healthy Kids

Irrational thinking and beliefs are core issues when youth arrive. These powerful principals are essential in Cognitive Restructuring.

Feelings Are Not Externally Caused. Although people experience feelings in particular circumstances, the circumstances do not cause the feelings. Instead, a person's emotional response reflects his or her thinking about the circumstances. People feel not so much in response to what happens to them, but in response to what they think about what happens. This is a major revelation, because people have control over what they think, even when they can't control what happens. By controlling their thoughts, individuals can gain emotional self-control. Happenings don't cause feelings; happenings plus irrational thoughts do.

Dissatisfaction Is Different From And Does Not Inevitably Lead To Disturbance. People and circumstances can frustrate, deprive and inconvenience you, but only you can disturb yourself.

Abandoning absolutism: This black and white thinking includes:

- Demanding that things be different understanding we can't control other people or the way the world is.
- Copping Out Nothing is my fault, refusal to accept responsibility.
- Over generalizing & Overstating.

 Catastrophizing Making mountains out of molehills.





The old Hamby Family Ranch was owned by Deschutes County in the 1960's, when Lyle and Mary Jarvis and Bill and Nelsyne Jones recognized the need for local troubled teenage boys to live in a structured environment based on accountability. They established a non-profit organization (J Bar J) in 1968 and worked to get the ranch donated by the county to help these young men. After the ranch was donated, Lyle and Mary Jarvis moved in and established a working ranch with five troubled boys.

Through this work with adjudicated boys, the leadership of J Bar J saw possibilities for helping other at-risk youth seek a better path, rather than make the choices that might lead them into the juvenile justice system in the first place. This inspired the addition of programs like a boarding school for girls, assistance and shelter for runaway and homeless youth, and matching 'Big' mentors with 'Littles' who could use a positive adult role model.

The purpose for all seven of our programs is to equip youth with the tools support to restructure thinking, succeed academically, and grow in responsibility to become productive citizens.
