

# Staff Speak at Conferences

In an effort to help others helping kids, J Bar J staff share their knowledge as presenters in regional conferences.

Cascade Youth and Family
Center's Eliza Allee facilitated a
training session about housing
options for runaway and homeless
youth after they leave our programs while she and other staff
attended the Runaway Homeless
Youth Grantees Regional Meeting
in Seattle Washington. This conference is put on by the Runaway
and Homeless Youth Training and

Technical Assistance Center and is attended by the Family and Youth Services Bureau's Runaway and Homeless Youth Program grantees and allied professionals.

The training emphasized Continuum of Care, Rapid Re-Housing project and highlighted how Cascade Youth and Family Center has learned to navigate the Coordinated Entry System, and how to best advocate for homeless youth.

About her experience, Eliza said, "The group was really interested



to learn about how J Bar J programs prepare youth for independent living from the day they come into our programs. I was able to answer questions and use examples based on what we are doing with our clients. I was invited to come to the national conference to talk more about my experience."

Mid-June, Suzie Rozen and Sandy Vaughn from the Academy at Sisters will lead a session at the National Association of Therapeutic Schools and Programs (NATSAP) regional conference about Equine Assisted Psychotherapy (EAP) in a therapeutic boarding school environment called "Teens and Horses: Understanding and Utilizing Effective Treatment for Success."

NATSAP serves as a "national resource for programs and professionals assisting young people beleaguered by emotional and behavioral difficulties."

Their members include therapeutic schools, residential treatment programs, as well as wilderness therapy programs, and outdoor therapeutic programs.

The Academy at Sisters provides Certified EAP as an integral part of their program for all students.





### Bigs and Littles in La Pine

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Oregon (BBBSCO) is celebrating 25 years of defending potential in our region by expanding into the La Pine community.

Our plan includes matching 20 local "Littles," kids who can use a positive role model, with Big Brothers or Big Sisters. We have met with La Pine Mayor Daniel Richer, presented to the Sunriver/ La Pine Rotary, and are reaching out to local businesses in hopes of finding sponsors to help support the new matches.

Children perform better in school and make better choices when they know someone cares and is en-



couraging their development. The community benefits as a whole when its youth are making better choices. This program is not only about LaPinians igniting potential in their youth, but also working together to build a strong community culture.

Sharing experiences and the will-ingness to influence a kid's life are key characteristics to be Big Brothers or Big Sisters. Matches are made based on interests and the type of activities the potential Big and Little enjoy. Kids and mentors in the program come from a variety of backgrounds.

The activities they share, from

mountain biking, to fixing an old car, to playing board games, matters less than the time spent together.


