

Our Beginning

ur story began with a phone call and a 'yes.' Lyle Jarvis was the vice principal and Dean of Students at Bend High when he answered a call from Judge Penhollow. In the late 1960s, Penhollow handled all the juvenile justice cases in Deschutes County and he had a dilemma.

"I have this kid who is causing trouble and I've got to send him to MacLaren because I can't find another option." MacLaren Correctional Facility wasn't what this youth needed – Penhollow believed he would benefit more from a stable, structured home life than incarceration, but he didn't have one.

Lyle responded, "We'll take him." Lyle and his wife, Mary, along with the 5 children of their own, stepped up and opened their home to help this first boy.

Then, through a foreclosure, Deschutes County became owners of a 40-acre ranch on Hamby Road where the Jarvis family, along with Bill and Nelsyne Jones, opened a facility in 1968 to help teenagers in trouble as an alternative to jail. Jarvis and Jones named it J Bar J Boys Ranch.

Following the inspiration and example of our founders, J Bar J Youth Services continues to respond with 'yes.' As unmet needs arise in our community, we respond by working with others to solve issues and by developing programs to help underserved and underrepresented youth.

Big Brothers Big Sisters pairs caring adult mentors (Bigs) with kids (Littles) to defend, ignite, and empower potential. These relationships enhance mentees' futures, improving academics and fostering personal growth.

Kindred Connections mobilizes mentoring families and church communities, providing support during crises like job loss or homelessness. Grandma's House shelters and supports homeless, pregnant, or parenting youth, providing tools and education for a self-sufficient future. For over 30 years, it has been the sole shelter and program of its kind east of the Cascades in Oregon.

Cascade Youth & Family Center provides shelter and programs for youth in family crisis, who have runaway, or are experiencing homelessness.



t the age of sixteen, Sierra became homeless. Situations with her family left Sierra without a stable home and difficulty getting to and from school. Sierra's family moved from place to place, staying with friends and family members, or in the family van that continually broke down and had to be moved constantly due to city parking ordinances.

Many of the places that Sierra stayed when with her family made her feel uncomfortable and unsafe. Sierra began seeking places to stay with her friends and acquaintances, which was also not ideal. After a year of instability, Sierra's parents left the state without her.

At this point, Sierra was referred to the LOFT by Cascade Youth and Family Center's Street Outreach Team, and she decided to seek support there. The LOFT provides youth a safe place to live, help to complete their education, learn life skills, receive employment training and help finding employment. Youth also engage in healthy relationships, participate in recreation, and ultimately become productive citizens.

Sierra felt safe and cared for from the moment she entered the LOFT. She was able to resume her education and begin moving towards a life of self-sufficiency and options. The LOFT Case Managers helped Sierra define life goals and she began working to fulfill them.

Sierra is excited to be approaching her eighteenth birthday and is dreaming of one day creating a healthy living space of her own.

ince Julia was young, her mother struggled with addiction. This demon ruled her life. Every choice and every consequence was influenced by her dependency. This resulted in Julia and her mother often being homeless.

When first homeless they stayed with family members. These relationships were eventually fractured because of her drug use. At a point, Julia and her mother moved in with her mom's boyfriend. But, like her family, the boyfriend soon tired of the situation and on a night propelled with violence, Julia and her mother found themselves on the street. Feeling

scared and vulnerable, they set up camp in a dumpster enclosure.

For Julia, it wasn't easy to be a homeless teenager. She worried about what her friends would think about her sordid living conditions if they found out, so Julia dropped out of school. She did reach out to her school counselor and this counselor's concern led Iulia to The Cascade Youth & Family Center's LOFT Transitional Living Program. Julia is now back in her home school, catching up on credits, earning good grades and is integrating into a productive and positive life at The LOFT.

Julia has hopes and dreams of continuing her education with the goal of moving on in life with a college degree and a successful career.

Torree's journey with Big Brothers Big Sisters began long before meeting Lilliana, with her first Little Sister, who is now a parent herself- truly a rewarding experience.

The continuation of Torree's mentorship journey with a new Little (Lilliana) and their exploration of diverse activities underscore the depth of their relationship, spanning an impressive 8 years.

Engaging in activities such as rock climbing, whitewater rafting, snow-boarding, and exploring local food cart lots not only creates enduring memories but fosters personal growth through shared experiences for both of this team. Torree's willingness to step outside her comfort zone with these activities serves as an inspiring example for Lilliana, encouraging a similar mindset. Torree's reflection on the privilege of witnessing Lilliana grow and learn about life and sharing experiences like her first trip to the ocean, highlights the meaningful impact mentors can have. It also highlights the joy the mentors receive from the relationship.

Torree's role as a positive force in the life of her Little is commendable, and we extend our gratitude to her for sharing the joy and fulfillment she has found as a Big Sister. Her commitment to foster growth, create memories, and find joy in the smaller moments serves as a truly inspiring example for us all.

Youth Advisory Council

t is well documented that homelessness in youth is one of largest risk factors for homelessness in adulthood. Helping youth while they are young is a strong step to preventing their homelessness later in life.

A key component informing the work of the Homeless Leadership Coalition (HLC) regarding youth homelessness is J Bar J's Youth Advisory Council (YAC). This group is made up of youth currently living in Grandma's House or Cascade Youth & Family Center's LOFT, two shelters licensed for unaccompanied youth, as well as former residents who have transitioned into stable housing.

The Youth Advisory Council participates in HLC community meetings, identifies gaps in the system, and reviews policies and procedures. They are involved in every step of the planning process of the HLC when addressing programs for youth.

The Council has guidance and support of adult staff to ensure their

recommendations follow best practices.

We asked council member Adrienna Guerrero about her experience and why she participates. "I heard about YAC, and I was so thrilled and excited to be part of something that's going to impact not just my family but many other youth in the community. Being a part of YAC has changed my perspective on everything. I have so many ideas about what we can do better in our community, an opportunity that comes once in a lifetime. I would love to see more family shelters available to youth and young adults. I want to see change. One day at a time they tell me but let me tell you it's one idea after the next."

Adrienna shared a quote with us by Oprah Winfrey: "Step out of the history that is holding you back. Step into the new story you are willing to create." She continues, "This quote means to my family despite everything we've been

ma caused by a childhood of homelessness and parental mental health issues, sixteen year old, Kayla is rebuilding her life as a resident at Cascade Youth and Family Center's LOFT program. When asked what she values most about the program, Kayla points to the safety and support the LOFT has provided. As important as that is to Kayla, she is also receiving the mental health support needed to identify and deal with the internal trauma she faces on a daily basis from a past that held very little safety for her.

Kayla entered the LOFT with only two highschool credits. With the help of Kayla's case manager and an educational support team, she is currently in a credit recovery program that will help her earn diploma.

For the first time, Kayla has the educational aid and support needed to attend school regularly and succeed. As Kayla acclimates to the safety and structure of her new life, she is beginning to identify long term strategies for her future that look very different from any goals she had while homeless. Kayla would like to become a neonatal nurse. With continued support and determination, that may very well be an attainable goal.

future. He is moving with his fiancé and baby to be surrounded by family and make a new start. Jeremiah successfully transitioned out of our program in 2021. Since then, he has consistently kept in touch with the staff, including times when he needs support, advice, and motivation.

While at the JBar JBoys Ranch, he completed multiple training programs, including *Thinking*, *Changing*, *Rearranging* — which teaches how our beliefs and thoughts impact our choices,

and in turn create our futures.

In the time since leaving our program, he first transitioned into a foster home / independent living program. After four months, he moved to his own apartment and has been working in the community since that time.

He stopped by the Boys Ranch just a few weeks ago to visit with his past treatment providers. We are proud of Jeremiah for the path he is on, and happy that stays in touch. We wish him success in his move and his future as a husband, father, and thriving member of his new community.

trajectory



Before the Academy, I struggled with an immense amount of unresolved trauma. When I was 14, I started looking to promiscuity, self-harm, and substances to numb. As a result, I got myself into dangerous situations with unhealthy people. The path I was going down was scary and it was enough for my family to quickly start looking for treatment options.

When I came to the Academy, I was in a deep state of dissociation. When people talked to me it would sound muffled and I had a hard time processing the things around me. I was so deep in it I started developing symptoms of Dissociative Identity Disorder. By graduation, I start-

ed to feel like myself again, for the first time in years. I owe my recovery to the integrative equine program the Academy offers. Over time with the assistance of the equine staff, I developed control of my emotions and started slowly moving myself out of dissociation. Eventually, where I once couldn't get one horse to listen to me, I was moving the entire herd by myself. Being more in tune with my emotions also helped me make more friends as I was now able to read rooms and identify how other people were feeling as well.

With consistent therapy and guidance from my treatment coordinator, I was able to have a personalized experience that helped me identify and focus on specific goals. As a result, I was able to develop more love for myself, more productive ways to deal with difficult emotions, set healthy boundaries, and a wide range of other skills.

I can confidently say if it wasn't for the help of the Academy I wouldn't be in college working towards my bachelor's degree and I wouldn't have happy and healthy relationships with my friends and family. Those who fully utilize the skills and remove focus from being away from family and friends will reap the same benefits. It is hard, but if being happy was easy everyone would do it.

- In 2023, every student shared with us that they felt better emotionally and in their relationships. On average, they reported feeling 39 points less distressed, according to the Youth Outcome Questionnaire.
- Our graduates had even more to celebrate! Their emotional and relational distress dropped by an average of 55 points.
- When our students feel better emotionally and in their relationships, they also start doing better overall. Their wellbeing improves, and they find it easier to tackle life's challenges.
